The Monarchs slipped past the Yellowjackets in a 4-2 victory, showcasing some speed from the start and never letting up. Sean Soares kicked off the action for the Monarchs, burying the puck at 8:20 in the first period, assisted by Mark Hayhurst. Just a few minutes later, Ben Perrotta doubled the Monarchs' lead with a crisp shot, thanks to assists from Matt McCourt and Matt Gibson. With a 2-0 lead heading into the second period, it was clear the Monarchs were buzzing while the Yellowjackets were left scrambling.

The second period saw more of the same, with Mark Hayhurst notching what would prove to be the game-winner at 9:28, assisted by Perrotta. The Yellowjackets, however, refused to go down without a fight. Eric Murray sparked hope for a comeback with a goal early in the third, assisted by Bill McIver. Just two minutes later, Scott Kelly followed suit, narrowing the gap to 3-2 and giving the Yellowjackets a glimmer of hope. The momentum had clearly shifted, but the Monarchs had other plans.

With the Yellowjackets pressing hard in the final minutes, the Monarchs sealed the deal with an emptynet goal by Steve White at 1:17, assisted by McCourt. Despite a late-game surge, the Yellowjackets couldn't overcome the Monarchs' early dominance. In a hard-fought matchup, the Mariners sailed past the Knights in a thrilling 3-2 victory, powered by Kyle Smythe's clutch performance and some relentless third-period pressure. The Knights struck first, with Patrick Sharp lighting the lamp at 8:58 in the first period, assisted by Adam Fenton. Just minutes later, Matt Smith doubled the Knights' lead with an unassisted beauty, putting the Mariners on their heels early. But the Mariners weren't ready to sink—they rallied with a quick response at 1:11, as Kyle Smythe netted a crucial goal with help from Dave Kendrick and Mike Fay, keeping them within striking distance.

The second period belonged to the Mariners, with Collin Brennan tying things up at 2-2 with a sharp play at the 3:00 mark, assisted by Alex Lee and Mike Fay. The Knights, struggling to generate offense in the middle frame, couldn't find a way past Mariners' goalie Mike Ciavattieri, who held firm after a busy start. The shots were piling up for the Mariners, while the Knights were held to zero in the period, clearly showing the shift in momentum.

It was a hard-fought 3rd period until Smythe struck again, this time netting the game-winner with an assist from Fay with just 17 seconds left in the game. The Knights' goaltender, Mark Dwyer, put up a valiant effort, but the Mariners' offense was simply too much to handle. Despite a late push from the Knights, Ciavattieri stood tall between the pipes, sealing the Mariners' comeback win. In a high-octane battle, the Threshers overwhelmed the Bulls with a 7-4 victory, showcasing an offensive masterclass that left their opponents scrambling.
