In a game defined by dramatic swings and a thrilling overtime finish, the Monarchs edged out the Knights 4-3 with an unforgettable performance by Steve White. The Monarchs got on the board early in the first period with White's opening goal, assisted by Ben Perrotta and Jason Standish. The Knights, however, responded fiercely in the second period, with Brian Pineau and Mike Dwyer scoring two quick goals to take a 2-1 lead, putting the Monarchs on their heels.

As the third period unfolded, the Knights extended their lead with a goal from Mike Ransom, assisted by Adam Fenton and Chad Gillpatrick. It looked like the game might be out of reach for the Monarchs, but Sean Soares sparked a rally at 08:24, closing the gap to 3-2. A power-play opportunity soon followed, and Dan McKinney took full advantage, tying the game at 3-3 with under four minutes left. Both teams fought desperately to avoid overtime, but the buzzer signaled an extra period.

The overtime was brief but electric. Just over two minutes in, Steve White returned as the hero, scoring the game-winning goal off a beautiful setup from Sean Soares and Brant Humfryes. Buddy Johnson stood tall in goal for the Monarchs, making key saves to hold the Knights at bay. With that, the Monarchs clinched a 4-3 victory, sending their fans into a frenzy and leaving the Knights wondering what might have been.



The Yellowjackets soared to an 8-3 victory over a very shorthanded Threshers squad in a commanding performance that left no doubt as to which team was in control. It all started with an early first-period goal by Eric Johnson of the

Threshers, giving them a brief glimmer of hope. But the Yellowjackets quickly turned the game around with a trio of goals within nine minutes. Eric Murray opened the scoring for the Yellowjackets at 08:18, followed by Ryan Twigg and Murray again to finish the period with a 3-1 lead. The Threshers were left scrambling to keep up.

The second period was all Yellowjackets, and Eric Murray was the name on everyone's lips. With a hat trick by 08:45, Murray essentially iced the game, unassisted on his third goal. The Yellowjackets' offensive onslaught continued with additional strikes from Chris Boussy and Ryan Twigg, who found the net in rapid succession. The Threshers looked outmatched, and Joe Burke in goal could only watch as his defense crumbled under the pressure. A glimmer of resistance came in the form of a last-second unassisted goal from Eric Johnson, but the damage was done, with the Threshers trailing 7-2 heading into the final period.

The third period was a mere formality, though Matt Kennedy extended the Yellowjackets' lead with a goal at 10:24. Eric Johnson completed his hat trick for the Threshers with a goal at 01:54, but it was too little, too late. Goalie Howie Bumpus was stellar for the Yellowjackets, and their defense ensured the Threshers had no chance at a comeback. With an 8-3 final score, the Yellowjackets flew away with a resounding win, leaving the Threshers to regroup after a humbling defeat.



In a battle that saw the Bulls and Mariners exchange blows, it was the Mariners who ultimately sailed to a 5-2 victory, thanks to a well-balanced offensive showing and airtight goaltending from Mike Ciavattieri. The first period set the tone, with the Mariners striking first at 10:12 when Mike Tantillo buried a pass from Peter Krukiel. Tom Andrade held his own in net for the Bulls, but Ciavattieri's brilliant performance kept the Mariners on top. The Bulls' offense couldn't find an answer, and as the clock ran out, the Mariners sailed smoothly to a commanding victory, cementing their dominance on both ends of the ice.

The Fury, while matching the Spartans in shots throughout, couldn't find a way past Brandon Cardoza, who stood tall between the pipes for a flawless performance.

The second period saw the Spartans build on their momentum with Bill Petrarca doubling their advantage at 11:23, thanks to assists from Mike Martin and Pete Cleary. While the Fury pressed forward, hoping to get on the scoreboard, Cardoza remained impenetrable, denying their attempts with cat-like reflexes. Dan Nason, the Fury's netminder, was equally sharp, but his efforts weren't enough to stop the Spartans from pulling away.
