

In a battle to avoid the basement of the standings, the Yellowjackets outlasted the Bulls 3-2 in a tense, low-scoring affair, improving to 2-3-0 while the Bulls slid further into the abyss at 1-4-0. Both teams entered desperate to shake off their losing records, and it was the Bulls who struck first, with Andy Cancellieri scoring an unassisted beauty at 10:50 of the first period. But the Yellowjackets, stinging from their own recent woes, responded quickly. John Petricig, fed by Dan Chouinard, tied it up less than a minute later, and Eric Murray gave the Yellowjackets the lead at 3:09 with a nifty assist from Keith Wilson.

The second period saw the Bulls fight back on the power play. Cancellieri found his name on the scoresheet again, this time assisting Jason O'Connell's goal at 2:47, knotting the game at 2-2. However, the Bulls' momentum was constantly disrupted by penalties, with the Yellowjackets taking full advantage of the Bulls' struggles to maintain discipline. Despite some great goaltending from Tom Andrade for the Bulls, they couldn't convert opportunities, leaving the game hanging in the balance.

The third period was all about the Yellowjackets' determination to escape the cellar. Jason Bernard's game-winning goal at 4:10, set up by Bill McIver, sealed the deal, and despite a late roughing penalty from the Bulls' Marty Carabin, the Yellowjackets held on to secure the win. Howie Bumpus stood tall between the pipes for the Jackets, as the Bulls' offensive efforts faltered under pressure. The Yellowjackets are finally climbing up the standings while the Bulls continue their freefall.



The Knights roared back to winning ways, shutting out the Threshers 3-0 and regaining momentum with a solid 3-2-0 record. Meanwhile, the Threshers, after a promising start to the season, find themselves on a two-game skid, also sitting at 3-2-0. This matchup showcased the Knights' renewed focus and defensive prowess, with goaltender Mark Dwyer standing tall between the pipes for the entire 36 minutes, frustrating the Threshers' attack from start to finish.

The Knights struck early, with Chad Gillpatrick capitalizing on a Threshers' miscue at 11:11 of the first period, scoring an unassisted goal that ultimately proved to be the game-winner. The Threshers, unable to respond, left the ice frustrated as their offensive woes continued. This game marked a clear shift in the Knights' momentum, while the Threshers will need to regroup quickly to avoid further slipping in the standings.



The Masters Division standings just got a lot tighter as the Monarchs put together a commanding 4-1 victory over the Mariners, improving their record to 3-2-0 while handing the Mariners an identical 3-2-0 mark. In a game where the Monarchs were firing on all cylinders, Dan Buckingham was the standout star, picking up a hat trick and one assist, leaving the Mariners scrambling to contain him.

The Monarchs wasted no time getting on the board, with Buckingham opening the scoring at 11:25 of the first period, assisted by Dan McKinney. While the Mariners answered quickly with a slick goal from Kyle Smythe, it was Buckingham again who broke the tie just moments later, netting the game-winner off a perfect feed from Alex Bernstein.
