Top Sauce (3 Assist Game)


- Bill Hingston (Bulls) Hingston's playmaking skills were on full display with three assists!




Monarchs Shut Down Yellowjackets in 3-0 Victory

The Monarchs controlled the game from start to finish, securing a 3-0 shutout win over the Yellowjackets. A dominant first period set the tone, with Steve White and Matt Drew connecting on a pair of goals to give the Monarchs an early advantage. Mike Kelly extended the lead in the second period, assisted by Dan Buckingham and Todd Pomerleau, while the Monarchs' defense held strong to prevent any Yellowjackets comeback attempt.

Despite outshooting the Monarchs 18-11 in the second period, the Yellowjackets struggled to convert opportunities into goals. Goaltender Marc Utera delivered a perfect performance for the Monarchs, turning away all 23 shots he faced. Meanwhile, Bryan Prendeville battled in net for the Yellowjackets but was unable to withstand the early offensive surge from the Monarchs.

Discipline played a role in the Yellowjackets' frustrations, as penalties in the first and second periods disrupted their momentum. Sean Taylor was sent to the box for a too-many-men penalty early on, and Drew Fitzgerald was called for tripping in the second. Ultimately, the Monarchs' early offensive execution and rock-solid goaltending secured them a well-earned shutout victory.




Bulls Outgun Threshers in High-Scoring 6-3 Victory

The Bulls powered past the Threshers with a commanding 6-3 win, fueled by a hat trick from John Killion and a pair of first-period goals from Josh Sigsworth. The Bulls jumped out to an early lead with Sigsworth striking twice in the opening frame, including an unassisted effort just over five minutes into the game. Despite a second-period response from Eric Johnson of the Threshers, Killion's first goal helped the Bulls maintain control heading into the final period.

In the third, the Threshers applied heavy pressure, outshooting the Bulls 15-8, but Killion's clutch play sealed the game. After Johnson's second unassisted goal on the power play brought the Threshers within one, Killion netted the game-winner with assists from Bill Hingston and Marty Carabin. 
Mariners Cruise Past Knights with 6-2 Victory




Hawks Prevail Over Longhorns in Overtime Thriller
