Bulls Blank Vipers 4–0 Behind Hingston’s Winner and DeAcitis’ Shutout

The Bulls kept their strong Fall 2025 form rolling with a 4–0 shutout win over the Vipers, anchored by goaltender Vinnie DeAcitis, who stopped all 13 shots he faced. After a scoreless opening period, the Bulls broke the deadlock midway through the second when Bill Hingston netted the game-winner, assisted by Alex Mesheau and John Killion. That tally opened the floodgates, as the Bulls quickly took control.

Just three minutes later, Jason O’Connell doubled the lead with an unassisted effort, and Matt Norton stretched it to 3–0 before the period closed, again with Mesheau providing an assist. The Bulls outshot the Vipers 15–3 in the second, leaving goalie Brian Prendeville under siege while the Vipers struggled to generate chances of their own.

In the third, Marty Carabin capped the scoring off a setup from Killion, sealing the 4–0 result. The Bulls finished with a 26–13 shot advantage and continued to showcase their balanced attack, with Mesheau collecting two helpers and Killion contributing on both ends. For the Vipers, offensive struggles continued as they remained winless against top-tier opponents. The Bulls, meanwhile, look every bit like early contenders with both their scoring depth and airtight defense.

Douglas Hat Trick Powers Monarchs Past Mariners 4–1

The Monarchs rode a dominant performance from Kirk Douglas, who netted a hat trick, to secure a 4–1 victory over the Mariners. Douglas opened the scoring late in the first with an unassisted effort, setting the tone for what became a standout night. Despite being outshot 32–19 overall, the Monarchs made the most of their opportunities, while goaltender Jeff Delnickas turned in a strong performance between the pipes.

The Mariners briefly tied the game in the second when Peter Krukiel struck unassisted, but the Monarchs responded quickly. Ben Perrotta notched the game-winner midway through the frame off a feed from Steve White, and Douglas added his second of the night just minutes later to swing momentum fully back in the Monarchs’ favor. Their efficient offense capitalized on limited chances, outscoring the Mariners 2–1 in a period where they were outshot 13–7.

Douglas completed his hat trick in the third with help from Dan Buckingham and Jason Standish, cementing the win. The Monarchs’ defense and Delnickas’ steady goaltending held off a late Mariners push, including a 12-shot barrage in the final frame. With the victory, the Monarchs showed their finishing touch and scoring efficiency can overcome even heavy shot deficits, making Douglas’ three-goal night a highlight of the early season.

McMillen and Petricig Lead Yellowjackets Past Knights 5–2

The Yellowjackets continued their strong start to the season with a convincing 5–2 win over the Knights, powered by Trey McMillen’s two-goal night and a multi-point effort from John Petricig. Petricig opened the scoring in the first with an unassisted tally, giving the Jackets early momentum. Goaltender John Belanger was steady in net, stopping 19 of 21 shots to earn the victory.

In the second period, the Yellowjackets extended their lead while shorthanded as McMillen struck with help from Petricig. The Knights finally broke through less than a minute before the buzzer when Patrick Sharp buried one unassisted, making it 2–1. But McMillen’s game-winner early in the third, assisted again by Petricig, shifted control firmly back to the Jackets.

The Knights briefly cut the deficit to one with John Hagan’s marker, but late insurance goals from Rob Malone and Petricig — the latter into an empty net — sealed the win. Outshooting the Knights 28–21, the Yellowjackets showcased balanced scoring and timely finishing. With McMillen now up to five goals this season and Petricig contributing in all three zones, the Jackets look like early contenders in Fall 2025.

Bernard's Hat Trick Lifts Kodiaks Past Threshers in Overtime

The Kodiaks pulled out a dramatic 4–3 overtime win over the Threshers, thanks to a hat trick performance from Jason Bernard. The opening period was packed with action, as the Kodiaks and Threshers combined for five goals. Bernard struck first midway through the frame, followed by a goal from Tyler Fiumara. The Threshers battled back with tallies from Eric Johnson and Chris Jennings, but Bernard's second — on the power play with just 29 seconds left — gave the Kodiaks a 3–2 lead after one.

Both defenses tightened in the second period, keeping the score locked through 12 minutes of play. The Threshers finally evened the game in the third when Scott Ormiston converted on a setup from Mike Alexanian. That set the stage for extra time, where goaltenders Joe Burke and Mark Dwyer each came up with key stops to force the issue deep into overtime.

Just 31 seconds into the extra frame, Bernard completed his hat trick with an unassisted goal, clinching the victory for the Kodiaks. Outshooting the Threshers 48–31, the Kodiaks' relentless attack eventually wore down their opponent. With Bernard and Fiumara combining for five points, the Kodiaks showed their offensive depth, while the Threshers proved they could punch back but couldn't quite finish the upset.

McCafferty Leads Fury Shutout Victory Over Reapers

The Fury continued their season in commanding fashion, blanking the Reapers 6–0 behind a dominant two-way performance from Joe McCafferty. The scoring started on a first-period power play, when Eric Morgan buried the eventual game-winner with help from Dave Burke. Just minutes later, McCafferty netted his third of the season to double the lead, and the Fury never looked back.

In the second, Tom Hickie and Shawn Malloy extended the advantage, both capitalizing on sustained offensive zone pressure. McCafferty picked up an assist on Malloy's tally, adding to what was already shaping into a standout night. The Reapers, meanwhile, struggled to generate offense, managing only three shots in the frame as Fury goaltender Brandon Cardoza saw little action but remained sharp when called upon.

McCafferty put the game completely out of reach in the third, striking twice more — once midway through and again in the final minute — to complete a hat trick and a five-point effort. The Fury outshot the Reapers 44–17, showing their depth and relentless forecheck, while Cardoza earned the clean sheet. With McCafferty now leading all skaters in goals through opening week, the Fury have made it clear they intend to be contenders this season.

Longhorns Power Past Spartans Behind Balanced Attack

The Longhorns picked up a strong early-season win, defeating the Spartans 5–2 thanks to contributions throughout their lineup. After Doug Perkins opened the scoring for the Spartans, John Sances quickly responded with his second goal of the year to even things up. From there, the Longhorns seized momentum and never trailed again.

In the second period, Sances struck again before John Zimmer netted his fifth of the season, which stood as the game-winner. The Spartans managed a brief answer with a tally from Steve Figlioli, but the Longhorns’ defensive structure, combined with steady goaltending from Doc Smith, kept their opponents from mounting a comeback. Duggan, Hawks Capitalize on Chances to Down Bolts

Riccio’s Late Heroics Lift Chiefs Past Presidents 2–1

Young's Penalty Shot Heroics Propel Patriots Over Bulldogs 3–2
