The Yellowjackets opened their Fall 2025 campaign in convincing fashion with a 5–3 win over the Threshers, powered by rookie sensation Trey McMillen’s hat trick performance. McMillen wasted no time making his mark, striking twice in the opening period—once unassisted and once off a setup from veteran Eric Murray. The Threshers answered late in the frame on a power-play goal from Kenny Jacobson, but momentum clearly tilted toward the Yellowjackets early.

The second period showcased the Yellowjackets’ depth, with Rob Malone burying a feed from McMillen, and Ryan Twigg netting what stood as the game-winner just three minutes later. The Threshers struggled to generate sustained pressure, managing only four shots in the frame compared to the Yellowjackets’ eight. By the end of 24 minutes, the Jackets held a 4–1 cushion, keeping goaltender John Belanger well-protected between the pipes.

In the third, the Threshers mounted a late surge. Scott Ormiston and Duncan Morrissey each lit the lamp to cut the deficit to one, but McMillen sealed the outcome with his third goal of the night at 2:09, assisted by Chris Boussy. Final shots were nearly even, with the Threshers at 21 and the Yellowjackets at 22, but Belanger’s steady play secured the win. McMillen’s breakout debut not only led all scorers, but also set the tone for what could be a special season for the Yellowjackets.

Bulls' Killion Nets Hat Trick in 9–4 Triumph Over Monarchs

The Bulls flexed their offensive firepower in a 9–4 win over the Monarchs, led by John Killion's three-goal, one-assist performance. After falling behind early on a goal from Dan Buckingham, the Bulls roared back with three straight tallies in the opening frame. Killion opened the scoring for his side, followed by Rich Fuller and Tom Powers, giving the Bulls a 3–1 advantage before the Monarchs trimmed it to 3–2 just before intermission.

The second period continued the back-and-forth pace. Killion struck again unassisted, but the Monarchs' Mark Hayhurst and Ben Perrotta combined to respond. Fuller then buried the game-winner at 3:34, set up by Alex Mesheau and Josh Tobias, before the Monarchs closed the gap once more in the final minute. Despite being outshot 14–11 in the first, the Bulls found their rhythm and finished the night with a commanding 42–30 edge in shots on goal.

In the third, the Bulls overwhelmed the Monarchs with a relentless four-goal barrage. Hingston and Powers each added unassisted strikes, while Killion completed his hat trick at 8:24. Fuller capped his own hat trick late, finishing a highlight night with three goals and an assist. Goalie Tom Andrade held firm in net, playing all 36 minutes to secure the win. With both Killion and Fuller leading the way, the Bulls sent a strong message that their offense may be one of the most dangerous in the Winter 2025 campaign.

Kodiaks Claim First Victory With 4–3 Win Over Fellow Expansion Vipers

In a matchup of two brand-new expansion teams, the Kodiaks earned their first franchise win by outlasting the Vipers 4–3. After a scoreless opening frame, both squads traded blows in a wild second period that saw six combined goals. Tyler Fiumara opened the scoring for the Kodiaks, but Johnny Camara answered quickly for the Vipers. Jack Allen's unassisted tally briefly restored the lead, only for Albert Clark and Mike McCarthy to each respond for the Vipers. Tom Persson's strike late in the period kept the Kodiaks even at 3–3 heading into the final frame.

The deciding moment came in the third when Robert Mooney netted the game-winner at 11:39, finishing off a setup from Jason Bernard. That marker held up as Kodiaks goalie Mark Dwyer shut the door the rest of the way, logging all 36 minutes in net. Despite a spirited effort from the Vipers, they were limited to just three shots in the final period, a stark contrast to the Kodiaks' steady offensive push.

Overall, the Kodiaks outshot the Vipers 29–13, highlighting their offensive control throughout the contest. Bernard quietly put together a strong two-assist night, while PJ Senatore contributed on all three Vipers goals with a trio of helpers. The game may not have lacked mistakes—penalties for roughing and even a rare throwing-stick call—but the intensity reflected two clubs eager to make their mark. For the Kodiaks, this first win marks a historic step in what promises to be an exciting rivalry with their fellow newcomers.

Fury Dominate Mountainmen 6–1 Behind House and McCafferty

Zimmer’s Four-Goal Showcase Powers Longhorns Past Reapers 9–3

May’s Four-Goal Night Powers Patriots Past Presidents 6–3
