#### Boussy's Overtime Winner Lifts Yellowjackets Past Mariners in 5-4 Thriller

The Yellowjackets and Mariners put on one of the most exciting games of the young season, with the Yellowjackets prevailing 5-4 in overtime thanks to Chris Boussy's game-winner with just 53 seconds left in the extra frame. The Mariners came out strong in the opening period with goals from Shayne Fryia and James Doucette to take a 2-1 lead, but the Jackets responded late when Trey McMillen netted his sixth of the season off a setup from John Petricig.

Momentum shifted in the second as the Jackets surged ahead. Petricig scored his third of the season to tie the game before Ken Twigg buried a shot from the slot to give the Jackets a 3-2 advantage heading into the third. The Mariners refused to back down, with Fryia striking again midway through the period and Doucette

adding his second of the night to swing the lead back in their favor. But Boussy answered with a clutch unassisted tally at 4:56 to force overtime.

In the extra session, Petricig and Dan Chouinard - who each finished with four-point nights - teed up Boussy for the decisive goal, giving the Yellowjackets their second overtime win of the season. Goalie John Belanger stopped 23 of 27 shots in the victory, while Mike Ciavattieri made 21 saves in the loss. The Jackets, led by McMillen's hot scoring streak (now six goals on the year), continue to prove they're one of the most dangerous teams in the league when games tighten late.

### Foley, Knights Control Threshers 4–1 Behind Strong First Period

The Knights rode a dominant opening frame to a 4–1 win over the Threshers, powered by Sean Foley's two-goal night and sharp goaltending from Adam Figlioli. Foley opened the scoring at 8:53 with his second goal of the season, sparking a run that set the tone. The Threshers briefly answered with a power-play strike from Duncan Morrissey, but the Knights regained control just minutes later when Brian Pineau netted the game-winner off a feed from Matt Fredrickson. Foley added his second of the period with under a minute left, giving the Knights a 3–1 cushion.

After a scoreless second period, the Knights extended their lead in the third as rookie Sam Perkins scored his first career SSCHL goal at 10:31. Foley picked up an assist on the play, finishing with a three-point night (2G, 1A). The Threshers applied pressure, outshooting the Knights 21–14 overall, but Figlioli was steady between the pipes with 20 saves, denying several key chances to preserve the lead.

With the victory, the Knights improved their record to 2–1 on the season, showing resilience and opportunistic finishing despite being outshot in all three periods. For the Threshers, Morrissey continues to be a bright spot with his second tally of the year, but the team is still searching for consistency after surrendering three first-period goals.

### Bulls Hold Off Kodiaks 3–2 Behind Norton's Late Period Winner

The Bulls struck in the middle frame and hung on late for a 3–2 win over the Kodiaks, improving their strong start to the Fall 2025 campaign. After a scoreless first, Josh Tobias opened the scoring at 7:50 of the second with his first of the season, followed less than a minute later by Marty Carabin's second tally of the year. The

Kodiaks responded when Brandon Blake found the net at 4:12, but with just seven seconds left in the period, Matt Norton buried the game-winner off a setup from Alex Mesheau, marking his second goal of the season.

The third period saw the Kodiaks mount pressure and cut the lead to one on a shorthanded goal from Tyler Fiumara, who continues to be one of their most consistent offensive forces with three goals on the young season. Despite being outshot 21–14, the Kodiaks couldn't solve Bulls' netminder Tom Andrade, who turned away 12 of 14 shots for the victory. Norton and Carabin have now joined John Killion as reliable finishers for the Bulls, whose balanced scoring has carried them early.

For the Kodiaks, the loss drops them to 2–1 despite heavy offensive contributions from Fiumara and Robert Mooney, who each picked up points in the defeat. Penalties in the final minutes hampered their comeback bid, including a five-minute major misconduct to Rob Fleming that stalled momentum. The Bulls, meanwhile, continue to find timely goals and defensive stability, setting themselves up as one of the tougher teams to crack in the SSCHL Fall 2025 season.

### Monarchs Outlast Vipers in Overtime Thriller, Kelly Nets Winner

The Monarchs and Vipers delivered one of the most exciting games of the Fall 2025 season so far, with the Monarchs pulling off a 5–4 overtime victory thanks to Mike Kelly's heroics. The opening period set the tone with four combined goals: Matt McCourt struck first for the Monarchs, followed by Vipers' forward Albert Clark scoring shorthanded. Johnny Camara added another for the Vipers before McCourt set up Dan Buckingham to tie it 2–2 by the end of the first.

The Vipers reclaimed momentum in the second when PJ Senatore netted his first of the season, but the Monarchs stormed back in the third. Kirk Douglas continued his hot start with his fourth of the campaign, and Kelly tallied his first of the night just 90 seconds later to give the Monarchs a 4–3 lead. Brendan Bohld responded for the Vipers with under five minutes left, knotting the score at 4–4 and forcing overtime.

In the extra frame, Kelly delivered again, scoring the game-winner at 3:16 with help from Steve White, who recorded his third assist of the season. Despite the Monarchs being outshot 33–34 overall, goaltender Jeff Delnickas held strong to secure the win. With Douglas staying red-hot and Kelly finding his scoring touch, the Monarchs are shaping up as a dangerous offensive unit. Meanwhile, the Vipers continue to show resilience behind Clark and Camara but remain in search of a closing spark late in games.

### Spartans Stun Hawks in Shootout Victory

The Spartans clawed out a dramatic 3–2 shootout win over the Hawks, overcoming an early deficit and surviving a furious back-and-forth finish in regulation. The Hawks opened the scoring midway through the first when Frank Davis buried his third of the season off a feed from Jim Mulhern. Goaltenders Matt Nelson and Barry Kaiser then held strong until just 20 seconds into the second, when Jim Holmes converted for the Spartans to even the game at 1–1.

The third period was packed with drama. Mulhern, who had already set up the opening goal, scored one of his own with help from Davis to restore the Hawks’ lead. But with just two seconds left in regulation, Glenn Harnish stunned the crowd by knocking in the tying goal for the Spartans, sending the contest to overtime. Neither side could find the net in the extra session despite combining for 10 shots, setting the stage for a shootout finish.

In the tiebreaker, Nelson turned aside every Hawks attempt, while the Spartans converted once to secure the win. The stat line tells the story of a tight battle: the Spartans outshot the Hawks 35–33, with Nelson’s resilience proving decisive. With the result, the Spartans picked up their first shootout victory of the season, while the Hawks saw a strong effort from Mulhern and Davis spoiled by a last-second equalizer and a cold stretch in the skills contest.

### Astros Power Past Bolts with Balanced Attack

The Astros claimed a convincing 5–2 victory over the Bolts, using depth scoring and steady defense to secure their first win of the season. The teams traded early goals, with Jamie Jernegan striking first for the Bolts before Jerry Folkard answered less than 20 seconds later for the Astros. From there, the Bolts outshot their opponents 14–9 through two periods but struggled to solve goalie Andrew Pelley, who held firm in net.

The second period swung momentum firmly in the Astros’ direction. Barry Lines broke the tie at 4:47 before Matt Brennan netted what stood as the game-winner just 46 seconds later. Brennan, who had two assists in the season opener, continued his strong start by finishing with a goal and an assist on the night. That quick scoring burst left the Bolts chasing the game, despite Rick Welch’s 10-save effort through the middle frame.

In the third, Pete O’Brien extended the Astros’ lead before the Vitello brothers combined on a highlight tally that briefly gave the Bolts life. However, Sean Cannon iced the contest with an empty-net marker in the final

minute, capping a balanced night that saw five different Astros record goals. While the Bolts generated more shots overall (23–15), the Astros were clinical with their chances and improved their season totals behind Brennan, who now leads the club with three points through two games.

### Mountainmen Prevail in Overtime Thriller Against Reapers

The Mountainmen survived a furious rally from the Reapers to claim a 4–3 overtime victory, earning their first extra-frame win of the season. The opening period was packed with action, as Jay Daniels opened the scoring shorthanded before the teams traded tallies in rapid succession. Daniels added a second goal minutes later, and Jim Daniels chipped in as well to give the Mountainmen a 3–1 lead after one. The Reapers responded with pressure, outshooting the Mountainmen 17–11 across the next two frames.

Momentum swung in the second when Ronnie May buried his fifth goal of the young season, pulling the Reapers within one. Greg Cincotta then tied the game early in the third with his first of the year, assisted by Tom Smith. The win capped a standout performance from Jay Daniels, who notched his first two goals of the season, including a shorthanded strike that set the tone early. ### Fury Rally Past Longhorns in Overtime Comeback

The Longhorns came out firing in the first period, storming to a 3–0 lead on goals from John Zimmer, who notched his sixth and seventh tallies of the season, and Tom Welch, who picked up his first of the campaign. With momentum squarely on their side, the Longhorns looked poised to cruise, outshooting the Fury 9–4 in the frame and keeping goaltender Brandon Cardoza under steady pressure.

The second period, however, began to tilt in the Fury’s favor. Chris Harrington struck for his first of the year, assisted by Tom Hickie, cutting into the deficit. That goal sparked a third-period surge as Joe McCafferty, who continues his torrid start with his sixth goal of the season, buried a setup from Shawn Herron. Just over

two minutes later, Jay DiCarlo scored his first, with Neil Landry collecting his second assist of the campaign, bringing the Fury all the way back to even.

Overtime lasted just over four minutes before McCafferty delivered again, finishing off a feed from Shawn Malloy for his seventh goal of the year and second of the game. Cardoza, who settled in after the rocky first, backstopped the Fury with 20 saves on 23 shots, while Doc Smith took the hard-luck loss for the Longhorns. The comeback win marked a defining moment early in the season for the Fury, who proved they can respond under pressure and ride their top scorer when it matters most.

### Patriots Claim Tight Win Over Chiefs

The Patriots and Chiefs battled through a defensive standoff that saw neither team break through in the opening period. Both goaltenders, Mark Frano for the Patriots and Jeff Nawrocki for the Chiefs, were sharp from the start, combining to turn away 11 first-period shots as both squads struggled to establish sustained offensive pressure.

In the second period, the Chiefs finally broke the ice at 11:04 when Hank Mosca scored his first of the season, assisted by Peter Lynch. But the Patriots responded in dramatic fashion, striking back just one second before the buzzer as Chuck Kilfoye buried his second of the year off a feed from Mike Fay. The late equalizer shifted momentum squarely toward the Patriots heading into the third.

That momentum carried over when Paul Cavan netted the game-winner at 4:16 of the third, with Chris Healy picking up the assist. Frano stood tall the rest of the way, finishing with 14 saves to secure the 2–1 win. For the Patriots, it marked Cavan’s second goal of the young season, adding to Kilfoye’s strong start as both continue to provide timely scoring.

### Presidents Blank Bulldogs Behind Concannon’s Two-Goal Night

The Presidents controlled the pace from start to finish, defeating the Bulldogs 3–0 in a shutout effort led by goaltender Greg Lantz. The opening period set the tone as Steve Concannon scored the game-winner at 10:21, assisted by Mike Sullivan and Dan Coletti. Just minutes later, Corey Mackin added his first of the season unassisted, giving the Presidents a two-goal cushion after one.

Both teams tightened up defensively in the second period, with the Bulldogs generating more sustained pressure but failing to solve Lantz, who turned away all 15 shots he faced over the first two frames. Despite the Bulldogs holding a narrow 15–7 shots advantage heading into the third, it was the Presidents who proved more opportunistic.

Concannon struck again just 52 seconds into the third period, sealing the outcome with his second tally of the night and first multi-goal game of the season. The Bulldogs pushed late, but Lantz remained perfect in goal to secure the clean sheet. With the victory, the Presidents' offense showed depth and efficiency, while Concannon emerged as a key finisher to watch early in the campaign.
