Monarchs Outlast Knights in Tight 3–2 Battle

The Monarchs improved to 3-1-0 on the season with a gritty 3–2 win over the Knights, who fell to 1-2-1. The Knights struck first late in the opening frame when John Hagan buried his second of the year off a feed from Patrick Sharp. Shots were even at three apiece in the first, with both teams settling in for what proved to be a back-and-forth contest.

Momentum shifted in the second period as the Monarchs found their rhythm. Kirk Douglas continued his hot start to the season, netting his fifth goal off helpers from Matt Drew and Dan McKinney. Less than a minute later, Ryan Murphy broke through unassisted to give the Monarchs a 2–1 lead. They outshot the Knights 8–3 in the frame, keeping the pressure squarely on goaltender Adam Figlioli.

The Knights clawed back in the third when Chad Gillpatrick tied it with his first of the season, assisted by Justin Figlioli. But the Monarchs answered quickly, with Mike Kelly delivering the game-winner at 1:28, assisted by Murphy and Douglas. Goalie Jeff Delnickas secured the win with 8 saves on 10 shots, while Figlioli faced double the workload, stopping 17 of 20. The Monarchs' depth and balanced attack proved the difference in a clean, penalty-free matchup.

Vipers Strike Early and Hold Off Threshers in 5–3 Win

The Vipers rode a fast start to a 5–3 victory over the Threshers, jumping out to a three-goal first period that set the tone. Mike McCarthy opened the scoring at 11:02, followed quickly by tallies from Tom Doucette and Devin Lydon as the Vipers grabbed a 3–1 lead after 12 minutes. Ken Coulstring’s first of the season was the lone bright spot for the Threshers in the opening frame, despite outshooting the Vipers 10–14.

In the second, the Threshers surged with 20 shots on net but couldn’t close the gap. Swami Thangaraj pulled them within one at 2:08, but the Vipers answered with goals from Albert Clark and Brian Morgan, including the eventual game-winner. Johnny Camara chipped in his second assist of the night while Paul Szydowski added two helpers, keeping the Vipers’ offense rolling.

The Threshers fought to the final horn, with Eric Johnson netting a short-handed goal in the third, but their 36 total shots couldn’t solve Vipers goalie Brian Prendeville often enough. On the other end, Joe Burke stopped 27 of 32 in the loss. The Vipers improved to 2–1 on the year behind their balanced attack, while the Threshers’ strong shot totals suggest better results may be ahead if they can tighten up defensively.

Yellowjackets Buzz Past Kodiaks with Balanced 5–2 Victory

The Yellowjackets put together a steady three-period effort to claim a 5–2 win over the Kodiaks, powered by standout performances from John Petricig and Trey McMillen. Petricig opened the scoring at 5:00 of the first, then added another in the second on his way to a four-point night. McMillen chipped in two goals of his own, including the game-winner late in the second period, and capped things with an empty-netter to seal the victory.

The Kodiaks kept fighting, with Tyler Fiumara breaking through midway through the second and Josh Mavilia adding his first of the season in the third. Despite being outshot 12–5 in the opening frame, the Kodiaks battled back to nearly match the Yellowjackets in attempts the rest of the way, finishing with 21 shots to the Jackets’ 26. Mark Dwyer turned aside 22 in the loss, while John Belanger stood tall for the Yellowjackets with 19 saves.

For the Yellowjackets, the win highlighted their depth, as six different skaters hit the scoresheet. Dan Chouinard continued his strong season with two assists, bringing his setup total to seven, while Chris Bussy added a pair of helpers as well. With Petricig and McMillen now combining for 12 goals on the season, the Jackets look like a team finding its offensive rhythm. The Kodiaks, meanwhile, will look to regroup after dropping their second straight despite flashes of strong play.

Bulls Explode Early, Sail Past Mariners 10–2

The Bulls wasted no time putting their stamp on the game, erupting for six goals in the first period on just 12 shots. John Killion struck twice in the frame, bringing his season tally to six, while Jason O’Connell added a pair of goals of his own. Alex Mesheau factored heavily into the opening burst with a goal and two assists, including the unassisted game-winner at the 7:04 mark. By the first intermission, the Mariners were staring at a 6–0 deficit.

From there, the pace of the game changed. The Mariners settled in during the second and third, generating 18 shots after the opening period compared to just 9 for the Bulls. Tom Andrade held strong in net for the Bulls, turning aside 23 shots overall, while Mike Ciavattieri weathered the storm after the opening frame despite facing high-percentage chances early. The second period saw just a lone Bulls goal from Matt Norton, as play tightened considerably.

In the third, the Mariners broke through with goals from John Krukiel and Collin Brennan, but the Bulls answered back quickly to secure a dominant 10–2 win. Marty Carabin piled up four assists on the night, while Mesheau finished with a four-point game (1G, 3A). Though the scoreline was decisive, the final 24 minutes told a different story—one of a more balanced, hard-fought contest that showed the Mariners’ ability to regroup after a tough start.

Zimmer and Sances Lead Longhorns Past Bolts 7–1

The Longhorns came out firing and never looked back, rolling to a 7–1 win over the Bolts. John Zimmer opened the scoring just past the halfway point of the first, and though Mark Vitello answered quickly for the Bolts, Tom Welch buried what stood as the game-winner minutes later. That gave the Longhorns a 2–1 lead after one despite being outshot 7–5.

The second period belonged entirely to the Longhorns, who stretched their lead with three straight goals. Zimmer notched his second of the night and ninth of the season, while John Sances and Paul LaFond each found the back of the net to make it 5–1 heading into the third. Doc Smith held firm in net for the Longhorns, turning aside all eight shots faced in the frame as momentum swung completely their way.

Sances capped off the night with two more goals in the final period, finishing with a four-point performance (3G, 1A). Zimmer added another assist to close out a dominant five-point game (2G, 3A), as the duo powered the Longhorns offense. Rick Welch faced 14 shots in goal for the Bolts, but the lack of scoring support sealed their fate. The victory moves the Longhorns’ attack firmly into mid-season form, led by Zimmer now sitting at nine goals on the campaign and Sances hitting six.

Astros Outlast Fury in Overtime Thriller

The Astros struck first and controlled much of the early play, building a 2–0 lead through two periods. Ric Tomasi opened the scoring just over two minutes into the game, and Sean Cannon added another early in the second frame. Goalie Andrew Pelley turned away 22 shots through the first two periods, frustrating the Fury’s push despite their 22–21 shot advantage heading into the third.

The Fury finally broke through in the final frame with a pair of quick goals to erase the deficit. Joe McCafferty extended his hot streak with his eighth goal of the season on the power play at 8:03, and Tom Hickie followed less than eight minutes later to knot the game at 2–2. Brandon Cardoza kept the door closed in net long enough to force overtime, where both teams tightened up defensively.

In the extra frame, it was the Astros who found the answer. With under five minutes left in OT, Jeff Walsh delivered the game-winner unassisted, sealing a 3–2 win. The Fury outshot the Astros 34–28 on the night but couldn’t complete the comeback. The win lifts the Astros behind balanced scoring from Tomasi, Cannon, and Walsh, while McCafferty continues to pace the Fury with his eighth tally.

Jim Daniels Leads Mountainmen Past Hawks

In a tight, defensive battle, the Mountainmen earned a 2–1 win over the Hawks thanks to a pair of goals from Jim Daniels. Neither team found the back of the net in the opening period despite plenty of looks—Ron Hughes and Barry Kaiser kept things scoreless as the Hawks held a narrow 10–8 shot advantage.

Spartans Blank Reapers Behind Dykens' Shutout

The Spartans leaned on strong goaltending and timely scoring to claim a 2–0 win over the Reapers.
