Threshers Sink Mariners in 9–5 Shootout Victory

The Threshers came out firing and never let up, outgunning the Mariners 9–5 in a wild, high-scoring affair that had both benches gasping for air by the final buzzer. After falling behind early on a goal from James Doucette, the Threshers answered back quickly with tallies from Michael Thamert and Chris Jennings to grab a 2–1 lead after one. Both offenses looked dangerous from the jump, combining for 19 first-period shots and setting the tone for a back-and-forth battle.

In the second period, the Threshers' balanced attack started to take over. Ken Coulstring's unassisted goal and Thamert's second of the night helped widen the gap, while John Russell and Jennings continued to pile up points. The Mariners refused to go quietly, with Mike Fay and Shayne Fryia finding the net to keep things close, but goaltender Joe Burke came up big for the Threshers, turning away several key chances to preserve the lead heading into the final frame.

The third period was pure chaos on ice, with seven total goals lighting up the scoreboard. Jennings' go-ahead strike midway through the frame proved to be the game-winner, as Thamert completed his hat trick and Kenny Jacobson added two more for good measure. Despite late goals from Fay and Doucette, the Mariners couldn't match the Threshers' relentless pace. With crisp passing, timely finishing, and a full-team effort, the Threshers skated off with a statement win and plenty of confidence heading into their next matchup.

Vipers Stay Hot with 3–1 Win Over Yellowjackets

In a tightly contested matchup, the Vipers continued their winning ways with a 3–1 victory over the Yellowjackets, powered by another strong performance from goaltender Brian Prendeville and a late-game surge from their offense. Both teams came out flying in the first period, trading chances but failing to find the back of the net. The Yellowjackets’ John Belanger stood tall early, turning aside all seven Viper shots, while his teammates struggled to generate sustained pressure against the Vipers’ disciplined defense.

The scoring drought finally broke just seconds into the second period when Albert Clark pounced on a loose puck and buried an unassisted goal to give the Vipers a 1–0 lead. The Yellowjackets fought hard to respond, led by John Petricig’s aggressive forechecking and Sean Taylor’s playmaking, but Prendeville’s glove was unbeatable through two frames. The pace picked up late in the second as both sides tested their depth, but the score held steady heading into the final period.

The third period brought fireworks, as Petricig finally solved Prendeville with a snipe midway through to tie things up. The Bulls kept their perfect season alive with a commanding 4–1 win over the Knights, combining steady goaltending, smart puck movement, and relentless offensive pressure. Fury Light Up the Scoreboard in Nine-Goal Showcase

The Fury came out flying and never let up, overpowering the Hawks 9–3 in a high-octane showdown that was all gas, no brakes from the opening faceoff.
