THRESHERS RALLY PAST VIPERS 5-3 IN HIGH ENERGY BATTLE

The Vipers came out strong with a two-goal first period, but the Threshers mounted a steady comeback and skated away with a 5–3 victory. After Michael Thamert opened the scoring for the Threshers, the Vipers responded quickly with goals from Johnny Camara and Paul Szydowski, giving them a 2–1 lead after one. Despite being outshot 14–7 in the opening frame, the Vipers made the most of their chances early.

The second period shifted momentum firmly in the Threshers' favor. Goals from Pat Mulhern and John Russell turned a deficit into a 3–2 lead, with Thamert, Ken Coulstring, and Eric Johnson factoring into the scoring plays. The Vipers generated opportunities but were unable to solve Joe Burke, who stood tall in net through the middle frame.

The Threshers sealed the win in the third, beginning with the game-winning goal from Travis Dupuis off a setup from Duncan Morrissey. The Vipers kept hope alive with a late goal from PJ Senatore, assisted by Camara, but an empty-net strike by Thamert — his second of the night and ninth of the season — put the game out of reach. With points in all three periods and a 29–24 shot advantage, the Threshers' balanced attack and timely scoring secured the comeback victory.

YELLOWJACKETS STING KODIAKS 4–1 WITH STRONG SPECIAL TEAMS PLAY

The Yellowjackets controlled the pace all night, outshooting the Kodiaks 32–31 and striking first on an unassisted tally from Trey McMillen late in the opening period. The Kodiaks briefly drew even in the second when Robert Mooney converted a setup from Josh Mavilia and Rob Fleming, but the tie didn't last long. Just three minutes later, John Petricig buried the eventual game-winner on a breakaway, restoring momentum to the Yellowjackets.

The third period sealed it. Off a clean 4-on-4 faceoff win, Petricig stepped in and buried a top-shelf rocket midway through the frame. With the goalie pulled in the final seconds, McMillen struck again into the empty net for his second of the game and seventeenth of the season, putting the win beyond reach. Goaltender John Belanger was sharp when needed, stopping 30 shots for the victory.

Discipline hurt the Kodiaks - especially a costly major penalty to Bruce Sylvester in the second period. While the Jackets did not score directly on the majors, the extended pressure swung control of the game in their favor. The win keeps the Yellowjackets rolling, while the Kodiaks are left searching for answers after being outplayed at even strength and on special teams.

MARINERS RALLY, STUN BULLS 5–4 IN OVERTIME THRILLER

The Bulls came out firing, bookending the first period with a late strike from John Killion before the Mariners answered just 14 seconds later through Kyle Smythe. The second period turned into a track meet as both teams exchanged goals in rapid succession. Killion added his second of the night and Alex Mesheau chipped in another for the Bulls, but the Mariners stayed within reach thanks to tallies from Alex Lee and another from Smythe to make it 4–3 after two.

Mariners goaltender Ricky Welch steadied things in the third, holding the Bulls scoreless while Chris Robichaud buried the equalizer just three minutes into the frame. From there the game tightened, with both sides trading limited chances as regulation wound down. The Mariners' persistence paid off, forcing overtime despite being outshot 22–21.

In the extra frame, one play made the difference. At 2:27 of OT, Shayne Fryia picked off a loose puck, walked in alone, and buried the unassisted game-winner to complete the Mariners' comeback. It capped a resilient performance from a team that refused to go away, earning a well-deserved 5–4 victory in a back-and-forth battle.

MONARCHS CONTROL FROM START TO FINISH IN 4-1 WIN OVER KNIGHTS

The Monarchs wasted no time setting the tone, striking twice in the opening period. Ryan Boudreau opened the scoring late in the frame before Kirk Douglas added what would stand as the game-winner just three minutes later. Their strong start forced the Knights to chase early, and though the shots were close, the Monarchs carried both the momentum and the edge on the scoreboard.

In the second, Mike Kelly extended the Monarchs' lead with a solo effort at 7:02, giving his team a comfortable 3-0 cushion. The Knights answered shortly after when Sam Perkins snapped one home from Sean Foley, giving them a spark and briefly shifting the pace. Despite the push, Monarchs goaltender Jeff Delnickas held firm, turning aside 11 second-period shots to maintain control.

The Monarchs sealed the deal early in the third when Dan McKinney buried his fifth of the season off a setup from Boudreau. From there, disciplined defensive play and steady goaltending carried them the rest of the way. The Knights never found another opening, and the Monarchs skated off with a convincing 4-1 victory, matching the Knights shot for shot while finishing their chances with precision.

FURY ERUPT IN SECOND PERIOD TO POWER PAST ASTROS 5-2

The Astros came out firing with a high-pressure first period, outshooting Fury 13-4 and striking twice. Sean Cannon tied the game just over a minute after Fury's opening goal, and Matt Brennan put the Astros ahead 2-1 moments later. Despite the early deficit, Fury stayed composed, weathering the shot barrage thanks to strong goaltending from Brandon Cardoza.

Everything changed in the second period, where Fury delivered a decisive four-goal surge. Nate Powell tied the game on a power-play strike at 8:11, and Neil Landry followed with the game-winner just four minutes later. Tom Hickie added insurance before Landry capped the explosive frame with his second of the night. The Fury attack overwhelmed the Astros, turning a 2-1 deficit into a commanding 5-2 lead.

The Astros pushed hard in the third, generating 11 more shots, but Cardoza shut the door to finish with a 32-save performance. Fury's dominant second period proved too much to overcome, sealing a controlled and well-earned 5–2 victory.

BOLTS SURVIVE LONGHORNS' THIRD-PERIOD SURGE, WIN 6–5 IN OT THRILLER

The Bolts came out firing, grabbing a pair of first-period markers from Jamie Jernegan and Tony Rota, but the Longhorns answered with pressure and possession, keeping the shot totals tilted their way. Bob Sideropoulos struck twice—one in the first and another in the second—to keep the Longhorns in reach, but Chris Hanly's late-period goal sent the Bolts into the third up 3–2 despite being outshot nearly two-to-one.

The third period turned into a full-on beer-league track meet. The teams traded goal after goal, combining for five in under eight minutes. Dave Richardson and Shaun Vitello extended the Bolts' lead, but the Longhorns refused to fold. John Zimmer converted on the power play, and Michael Eddy and Brook Conley followed with clutch tallies, tying the game 5–5 with under two minutes left. The Longhorns had all the momentum—but Rick Welch slammed the brakes with a huge stop in the final seconds to push things to overtime.

In OT, the Bolts needed just one clean rush to finish the night. Mark Vitello buried the game-winner at 4:42, set up by Rota and Jernegan, completing a three-point night for each. Despite being outshot 28–17, the Bolts walked away with a gritty, chaotic, wildly entertaining 6–5 victory.

REAPERS PULL AWAY LATE, DROP SPARTANS 6–2 WITH THIRD-PERIOD ONSLAUGHT

The Spartans opened the night looking sharp, striking first when Paul Brinkmann finished a clean tic-tac-toe play with Rich Boyle and Steve Figlioli. But the Reapers punched right back less than two minutes later, with Dan Sloan burying the equalizer to swing momentum their way. After a tight, low-event first frame, the Reapers grabbed their first lead in the second when John Dunn converted on a smooth setup from Tom Smith and Scott Kelly, sending the Spartans into the break down 2–1.

The third period, though, belonged entirely to the Reapers. Tom Smith kicked things off with an unassisted game-winner, jumping on a loose puck and ripping home the go-ahead goal. From there, Sloan, Kelly, and Ronnie May piled on as the Reapers outshot the Spartans 20–3 in the final frame—an absolute shooting gallery that overwhelmed Matt Nelson despite his best efforts between the pipes.

Pete Cleary briefly gave the Spartans life with a goal midway through the third, but the Reapers' depth attack proved too much to contain. With four goals in the final 11 minutes and three Reapers posting multi-point nights, the squad skated away with a commanding 6–2 win and a statement that their offense can take over a game in a hurry.

HAWKS STUN MOUNTAINMEN IN OT, 2–1, BEHIND KAISER’S 31-SAVE PERFORMANCE

The Mountainmen came out strong and controlled much of the first period, finally breaking through at 11:12 when Pat Scully buried his eighth of the season off a crisp passing sequence from Jay and Jim Daniels. With a 13–5 shot advantage, it looked like they might run away early—but Hawks goalie Barry Kaiser had other plans, turning aside everything else that came his way.



The Hawks settled in during the second and capitalized on their best opportunity of the night: a power play just past the midpoint of the period. Peter Fallon evened the score, finishing a well-executed puck movement play with Don Sprague and Sean Soares setting the table. Suddenly the Hawks had life, and momentum shifted.

Despite both teams generating chances—Mountainmen especially in the third with 11 shots—it remained deadlocked thanks to stellar goaltending on both ends. Regulation solved nothing, bringing on overtime.

At 3:57 of the extra frame, Don Sprague delivered the dagger. Off a feed from Frank Davis, Sprague jumped into space and ripped home the game-winner, securing a 2–1 victory and a hard-earned two points for the Hawks.

Kaiser’s 31 saves were the backbone of the win, while Sprague factored into both goals, including the OT heroics. The Hawks were outshot 32–26 overall, but when it mattered most, they made their chances count.

Burke Nets Last-Second Winner as Chiefs Top Presidents 1-0
