#### Morrissey Leads Threshers Past Bulls 5–1

The Threshers controlled the pace from the opening puck drop, starting with Duncan Morrissey's first-period marker before the Bulls answered moments later through Bill Hingston. Both teams generated quality looks early, but goaltenders Vinnie DeAcitis and Joe Burke kept things tight heading into the second.

The middle frame belonged entirely to the Threshers. Morrissey struck again on the power play for what proved to be the game-winner, and the offense stayed hot with goals from John Russell and Travis Dupuis. The Bulls struggled to contain the cycle and were limited to just six shots in the period, unable to match the surge.

Michael Thamert added an insurance goal in the third to cap off the Threshers' dominant performance. With Joe Burke turning away all ten Bulls shots in the final period, the Threshers skated away with a convincing 5–1 win.

#### Vipers Explode Early, Cruise to 4–1 Win Over Mariners

The Vipers wasted no time taking control, erupting for three goals in the opening minutes of the first period. Albert Clark kicked things off with an unassisted strike, followed by the eventual game-winner from Johnny

Camara just 17 seconds later. With two seconds left in the frame, Brian Morgan buried a setup from Clark to give the Vipers a commanding 3–0 lead before the Mariners could settle in.

Tom Doucette extended the lead in the second, finishing a feed from Mike McCarthy to push the Vipers ahead 4–0. The Mariners finally answered when Shayne Fryia converted off a setup from Peter Krukiel, but it proved to be their only breakthrough against Brian Prendeville, who turned aside all seven shots in the period and remained sharp throughout.

The Mariners pushed in the third, matching the Vipers in shots for the night, but Prendeville held firm to lock down the win. With strong special-teams discipline and a dominant first period, the Vipers secured a decisive 4–1 victory.

### Yellowjackets Outgun Monarchs 5–3 Behind Petricig’s Three-Point Night

The Monarchs struck first when John Ray buried his opening tally of the season, but the Yellowjackets answered right back with Chris Yuknis evening things up just 30 seconds before the first buzzer. From there, the Jackets turned the game into a track meet, and the Monarchs just couldn’t keep pace.

John Petricig continued his electric season with a pair of second-period points—one to give the Jackets the lead, another helping set up Bill McIver as the offense started rolling. The Monarchs briefly tied it thanks to Ray’s second of the night, but Sean Taylor punched home the eventual game-winner moments later, giving the Jackets a lead they wouldn’t relinquish.

Petricig capped things off with a third-period insurance marker, part of a three-point performance that fueled the Jackets’ offense. Ryan Boudreau added a late one for the Monarchs, but it wasn’t enough as the Yellowjackets skated off with a strong 5–3 win.

### Kodiaks Rally Late to Stun Knights 4–3

The Knights came out buzzing, turning a 1–0 deficit into a quick 2–1 lead with goals from Matt Fredrickson and John Hagan just nine seconds apart. They carried that momentum into the second, where Hagan struck again to give the Knights a 3–1 cushion heading into the final frame. For two periods, the Knights looked in full control—sharp, composed, and shutting down chances.

But the Kodiaks flipped the script in the third. Andrew MacNeil kicked the door open with a goal at 10:22, and just nine seconds later Jason Bernard tied the game, lighting a spark on the Kodiaks bench. Suddenly, every shift swung their way. With 7:06 remaining, Chris Keating buried the eventual game-winner off a great setup from Robert Mooney and Bo Churchill, completing a furious three-goal surge in just over three minutes.

### Reapers Grind Out a 2–0 Win Over Astros

The opening period set the tone for a tight, physical matchup as both teams traded chances but couldn't find a way past their respective goaltenders. Howie Bumpus and Andrew Pelley turned aside everything they saw early, with the Reapers outshooting the Astros 11–7 but unable to crack the scoreboard. It was tense, methodical hockey with both sides feeling out the gaps.

The breakthrough finally came in the second. Ronnie May struck first at 7:11, burying the eventual game-winner off a clean setup from Scott Churchill. Just 24 seconds later, Steve Quinn doubled the lead, finishing a crisp passing play from John Dunn and Brant Humfries. The Astros struggled to answer as penalties disrupted their flow, and the Reapers controlled most of the frame with steady pressure and puck possession.

The third period saw the Astros push hard, even pulling the goalie for the final minute, but Bumpus stood tall to preserve the 28-save shutout. ### Fury Roll Past Spartans 5–1 Behind Landry's Big Night

Fury wasted no time taking control, striking just 20 seconds into the game when Neil Landry buried the opener off a setup from Jay DiCarlo. Spartans goalie Matt Nelson settled in afterward, but his team couldn't generate much pressure, managing only five first-period shots while Fury dictated pace and possession.

The second period belonged entirely to Fury. Landry notched the game-winner at 9:11—again assisted by DiCarlo—before Tom House and Shawn Malloy added two more goals during a dominant stretch that saw the Spartans on their heels. With a 4–0 lead and a 23–9 shot advantage through two periods, Fury had full control entering the third.

A string of unsportsmanlike conduct penalties followed on both sides, slowing the pace but never threatening the outcome.
