Yellowjackets Hold Off Knights for 4–3 Victory Behind Petricig’s Hat Trick

The Yellowjackets earned a thrilling 4–3 win over the Knights in a fast-paced contest that featured standout offensive performances and a tense finish. Trey McMillen opened the scoring in the first period with help from Mike Kennedy, giving the Yellowjackets early momentum. Goalie John Belanger stood tall in net, keeping the Knights from finding an equalizer through the opening frame.

In the second period, John Petricig took control, scoring twice — once unassisted and again with an assist from Chris Boussy — to extend the Yellowjackets’ lead. The Knights answered back with a goal from Bill Fisher, assisted by Sean Foley, but couldn’t fully close the gap before the intermission. Both teams traded strong chances, with the Yellowjackets maintaining a narrow edge through disciplined play.

Petricig completed his hat trick early in the third period, netting what would stand as the game-winner off a feed from Drew Fitzgerald. The Knights made a late push, with Sean Foley scoring twice to bring them within one, but Belanger and the Yellowjackets defense held firm. The Mariners delivered a dominant all-around performance in a 7–2 victory over the Monarchs, powered by a relentless attack and sharp puck movement. Shayne Fryia opened the scoring late in the first period, quickly followed by Steve Fay’s tally to give the Mariners an early cushion. The Monarchs’ Ryan Murphy briefly closed the gap with a well-placed shot, but the Mariners’ offensive pressure proved too much, outshooting the Monarchs 15–0 in the opening frame and setting the tone for the night.

In the second period, the Mariners took full control, with Fryia netting his second goal of the game on what would stand as the game-winner. Rob McDonnell and Alex Lee added goals to stretch the lead to 5–1, showcasing the team’s balanced scoring depth. Threshers Power Past Kodiaks 5–2 Behind Thamert and Johnson Connection

Thamert got things rolling in the first period, finishing off a setup from Johnson to give the Threshers a 1–0 advantage.
