RECAP



Yellowjackets vs. Vipers

Expect a chippy, emotional rematch after their OT thriller. The Yellowjackets bring structure, depth, and a top-tier finisher in Trey McMillen, while the Vipers thrive on momentum swings and big individual plays. If the Jackets control possession, they can smother the Vipers' counterattack—but if this turns into a special-teams battle, the Vipers have enough firepower to steal it. Physical, fast, and very likely tight on the scoreboard.

Bulls vs. Threshers

This one's power vs. precision. The Bulls are rolling after a statement win and have multiple lines contributing, making them dangerous in any period. The Threshers, meanwhile, have shown they can hang in low-event, defensive games and win on opportunistic scoring—especially in crunch time. If the Bulls' pace overwhelms early, it could tilt quickly, but the Threshers' ability to stay patient and strike late sets up a fascinating stylistic clash.

Douglas Delivers in Overtime as Monarchs Stun Kodiaks

The Monarchs rallied late and earned a dramatic 2–1 overtime win, overcoming an early deficit created by Jason Bernard's power-play strike for the Kodiaks in the first period. Despite generating fewer shots, the Monarchs slowly tightened their structure and stayed within reach.
