#### Monarchs Outlast Bulls in Overtime Thriller, 6–5

The Monarchs and Bulls delivered one of the most exciting games of the season, with the Monarchs ultimately skating away with a 6–5 overtime victory. The Monarchs struck twice in the opening period, including goals from Ryan Murphy and Kirk Douglas, while the Bulls answered with a tally from John Killion to keep things close at 2–1 after one.

### Kodiaks Edge Knights Late for 3–2 Victory
