#### Kodiaks Edge Vipers in Overtime Battle, 3–2

The Kodiaks rallied from an early deficit to defeat the Vipers 3–2 in an overtime thriller. The Vipers struck first in the opening period, as Johnny Camara found the back of the net off a setup from Ryan Reale to give his team a 1–0 lead. Both teams played a tight, defensive game early, with limited shots and strong goaltending keeping the score close.

#### Monarchs Stay in Control, Top Knights 4–2

The Monarchs used a strong start and consistent pressure to earn a 4–2 victory over the Knights. ### Yellowjackets Explode for Nine Goals in Rout of Threshers
