Threshers Spoil Vipers Playoff Hopes with Overtime Win

The Threshers delivered a crushing blow to the Vipers' playoff hopes, rallying for a dramatic 3–2 overtime victory, despite having only 6 players in the game. Yellowjackets Dominate Monarchs Ahead of Playoff Clash
